



# **News from your Parish Council**

The Parish Council met in the Memorial Hall on Monday 27<sup>th</sup> January 2025.

The Parish Council spent £1,090.78 from the main account, nothing from its Reserve account and received £3,000 for Major works into the Footpaths account. Items of expenditure over £100 were £1,000 annual grant to the Morchard Bishop Churchyard committee.

The Parish Council considered two planning applications:

24/00009/LBC	Listed Building Consent for the erection of	4 Wood Lane, Morchard Bishop	
SUPPORTED	an attached greenhouse.		
25/00045/HOUSE	Erection of single storey extension	Bishopsleigh Cottage, Black Dog, Crediton	
SUPPORTED			

Again, there was a lot of Correspondence to consider such as: a request to investigate areas in the village where there was no internal house mobile signal due to the landline providers moving more people from analogue to digital; road closures; a request for a grant; whether to move the domain of the Parish Council website and registering Council owned land.

You may have noticed that a lot of finger posts leading to the village have lost their fingers. Devon County Council will not replace these signs and so if they are to be replaced, the Parish Council will have to pay for them. We have received a quote of £2,595 to replace all the fingers that are missing. Before we make such a large payment which inevitably could add to your precept next year, may we offer an amnesty for anyone that has picked up any of these signs to place it in the "cardboard collecting" shed in the car park of the London Inn and save us having to pay for so many.

# **Gardening tips for March**



- Protect new spring shoots from slugs with barriers
- Where needed, prepare to apply nematodes for slugs once soil reaches 5 degrees celsius
- Plant shallots, onion sets and early potatoes
- Plant summer-flowering bulbs if in doubt plant bulbs

- Lift and divide overgrown clumps of perennials
- Top dress containers with fresh compost
- Mow formal lawns on dry days (if needed)

- Hoe and mulch weeds to keep them under control early
- Start feeding fish and using the pond fountain; remove pond heaters
- Prune bush and climbing roses





# The Impacts of Climate Change in the Arctic

The Arctic region comprises the northernmost parts of eight countries that lie inside latitude 66.5 degrees north of the Equator, including Canada, Alaska (USA), Russia, Greenland, Norway, Sweden and Finland. These are the areas that experience 24 hours of darkness during mid-winter. Average January temperatures are -35 degrees Celsius, and July temperatures -1.5 degrees C.

While average global temperatures have increased by 1.2 degrees C since the onset of the Industrial Revolution, those of Arctic regions have increased by 3 degrees, and average sea temperatures are increasing at the alarming rate of 0.5 degrees C each decade.

There are three reasons why Arctic temperatures are increasing so rapidly: the positive ice albedo feedback; convection; and water vapour. Convection of air in Arctic regions is weak, meaning warmed air stays close to the surface. Stronger convection of air over the tropics means more water vapour is transported to Arctic regions from the south. Water vapour is a greenhouse gas. Thirdly, as ice melts, less energy from the sun is reflected back to space (the albedo effect). The light coloured ice surfaces are replaced by the darker surfaces of sea and rock which absorb more solar radiation.

The most apparent consequence of rising Arctic temperatures is the reduction in ice. Current rates of ice reduction in Arctic regions is 12.2% per decade. The worst case scenario suggests that Arctic ice may have completely disappeared by 2070. Meltwater from Arctic glaciers and ice caps is responsible for 35% of global sea level rises. Rising sea levels in the Arctic means increased coastal erosion, up to 5m per year in some parts of Alaska; and increased flooding of Inuit settlements.

Perhaps the most familiar impact of climate change on the Arctic is the risk of polar bear extinction. Polar bears depend on the ice for hunting seals. During the spring hunting season the polar bears, especially the females, build up their fat reserves. They use the fat to survive the summer months when sea ice reduces during its annual cycle of summer melting and hunting is not possible. Furthermore, the warmer temperatures are having a negative impact on the food chain. Warmer sea temperatures result in reduced biomass of marine plants, thus depriving the smaller fish an important part of their diet. This deletion in food energy moves up the food chain through larger fish and seals, ultimately depriving polar bears. Malnourished bears are at greater risk from disease.

Other environmental impacts include changes in biodiversity as the tree line moves north and to lower altitudes and as alien plants from warmer climes invade the tundra. Alien creatures, such as the spruce bark beetle, destroy coniferous forests and impact negatively on the food chain. Finally, warmer temperatures will increase the incidence and extent of wildfires. Although, in the Arctic these events can be beneficial for some trees, frequent wildfires mean young saplings don't get the chance to mature and develop their natural resistance to fire.

For the Inuit groups living in the Arctic, warmer temperatures mean thinner ice which represents a danger to Inuit seal hunters and fishers. As fishing declines, the Inuit increase the hunting of caribou, which is resulting in a decline in their numbers. Food imported to supplement the Inuit diet is expensive.

One benefit of climate change in the Arctic is the opening of the northern sea route, linking Europe to the Pacific and Asia. This is now ice-free for more weeks than the historical six weeks.

## **Folk Tales Corner**

## Stories of Books of Tales of Fables

Sometimes looking for stories can become a quest in its own right. I mean who, having heard of their existence, could resist trying to get hold of a copy of "The Fables of Bidpai"?

A year or so back I was combing through an anthology of Classic Folk Tales From Around The World in search of any tales with bears in, when I came across "The Monkeys and The Bears", a tale from India which was not only perfect for my needs but unusually plotted, rich in character and graphically horrific.

It was one of only four stories in this rather hefty tome extracted from the aforementioned Fables of Bidpai, itself a collection of tales apparently related to an ancient Indian king - the titular Bidpai - as a sort of course in moral philosophy. Obviously I wanted more.

The only problem was that my web searches could not find any existing copies of a complete text going for less than a couple of hundred pounds. I was not the only tale hound to have struggled to find this treasure trove either. The original Indian transcript was lost to time before the mid sixteen hundreds, so the earliest existing manuscript is an Arabic copy from 750 CE, which gives you some idea of the great antiquity of the stories themselves. Thankfully, by the time I was telling "The Monkeys And The Bears" as a late night after-show extra for friends in Cambridge and loudly bemoaning the un-attainable nature of the larger work, someone had created a company specifically targeted at people like me called "Forgotten Books" who specialise in reprinting hard to come by volumes. One of my audience did the necessary search and by the time I had returned the monkeys to their bear-free homelands, a reprint of "The Earliest English Version of The Fables Of Bidpai" was on order for me.

It's not an easy book to read. I'm nearly half way through and we have yet to start on the first of the fables. It is a reprint of an 1888 publication which is itself a facsimile of a version from 1570. This obviously gets a preface and an introduction telling the tale of how the publisher, none other than the famous folklorist Joseph Jacobs, hunted down the earlier work and, of course, as much of the story of that book's history as he could find. As he says "It is the English version of an Italian adaptation of a Spanish translation of a Latin version of a Hebrew translation of an Arabic adaptation of the Pehlevi version of the Indian original."

So after 90 odd pages we eventually reach the 1570 version by a Thomas North. He gives us his own personal note "To The Reader". Do we, now, finally get to the stories we came for? No. Obviously the original collection was an anthology and no good scribe could collate a compilation without some explanation, so naturally it starts with a lengthy prologue!

Not only is this prologue a little hard to read due to the inherent pomposity of all academic writers, it has the additional stodge of second hand self-importance through translation, marinaded in the verbosity of the middle ages and, just to add some extra unpalatable spice, the brain melting typography of the early printing industry.

This last layer of unintelligibility comes courtesy of the great expense, and therefore shortage of movable type, which caused early typesetters to substitute a letter they had run out of with another letter that looked similar.

Thus, the famous use of the letter 'f' to replace the letter 's', which we are all familiar with and can generally interpret fairly easily. Mr North's printers however, were prone to shortages of i, j, u, v and more, leading to spellings like "ivftly", for "justly", and worse. At some point I hope I will manage to read the actual fables, and maybe when I've done so I will be able to tell you some!

# **Morchard Weather**

When she was at school she noticed that a number of pupils would deliberately miss the bus so that they could have a day off. She tried this and was sitting in the kitchen when her grandfather walked in and, assessing the situation, said to her that she could spend her day off cleaning out the pigs and the hens. She never missed the school bus again. When she was around 12 years old she overheard a fellow pupil on the school bus say that her mother had given birth to a baby boy - little did she realise that one day she would marry that baby boy. Another much loved member was born in Manchester where she lived in a terraced house on a cobbled street. In the summer the tar between the cobbles would melt and the only thing that would clean it off was butter.

Our guest of honour used to be the headmistress of Morchard Bishop School around 40 years ago. She said that it was wonderful to be able to give the children spontaneous treats on the spur of the moment. Now, the children would need to take a form home for their parents to sign and they would miss out on that experience.

We have a rich mixture of members: a number of farmer's wives of course, and two ladies who have lived in Morchard Bishop for 66 years. They threw themselves into their community and in spite of bringing up children and going out to work they started clubs and a nursery. Someone that we all know as a hard working member of this community, surprised some of us when she said that she had attended boarding school in Rhodesia. Who knew that we had such an exciting diversity of memories between us, all with widely different starts in life and ending up sitting in a circle together at a WI meeting in 2025.

On February 15th we hosted one of our 3 coffee mornings and in the afternoon at 2pm we hosted the Devon WI quiz - results in the next Morchard Messenger. This year we only had 8 WI's participating in the quiz, whereas in the past we have had more than 20 teams squeezed into the hall.



## Countryfile

You are brief and frail and blue-Little sisters, I am, too. You are Heaven's masterpieces-Little loves, the likeness ceases. Sweet Violets by Dorothy Parker (1893-1967)

Sweet violets, or wood violets (Viola odorata) are easily told apart from the common dog violet cousins (Viola Riviana) by their key named quality: their sweet scent. Dog violets have no nose, completely unscented, lovely to look at but nothing to make gay the nose in a posy.

Ideally, since they don't last long when picked and they are far more useful still alive and able to seed, we are checking this scent from the flower still on the plant, which with the plant growing close to the woodland floor, can be tricky, but as it's often at woodland edges and up slight banks, there is hope.

Flowering from March through to May its 5 oval petals are usually a deep blue violet colour and though white or lilac coloured flowers can naturally occur, all stand out nicely against the small heart shaped, slightly hairy, deep green leaves.

Their increasing scarcity is quite possibly down to over picking, but if you can plant a few plants in your garden in a spot they like and resist picking, they will joyfully self-seed around the area, as well as spreading out the parent plant. So as long as conditions are right it will quite successfully come back with a better clump every year, finding new patches to settle in, naturalising nicely under trees and around the edges of borders.

The scent of violets is a sweet and unusual one; folklore said you could only smell them once as they would steal your sense of smell if you did. It sounds like an odd tale from the fairies, but it turns out that the ketone (beta ionone) found in violets and valuable in perfumery, is related to retinol production in some animals and does directly affect olfactory function, stimulating it and then temporarily shutting off function! Research into the effects of adding it to foodstuffs has shown that there are also genetic variations in how we perceive it. There is also much more interesting research out there about the ketone in this little flower!

Away from the science and wonder, though, the violets are still one of the most delicate, beautiful and yet familiar, little flowers.

Roses are red, violets are blue, You can't smell beta ionone twice - it really is true!
