

Prunes in Port

Something different for the store cupboard!

You will need:

250gm/8oz stoned prunes (Agen prunes if you can get them)

25gm/1oz brown sugar

(Muscovado is best)

a cinnamon stick

a bay leaf



Place the prunes, bay leaf, and cinnamon stick in a preserving jar, and add brown sugar. Cover with port, seal, date, and label the jar.

Store for at least six months before using.

These are good to serve with fresh pineapple, or ice cream, and their rich flavour makes an unusual accompaniment to roast pork.





News from your Parish Council

The Parish Council met in the Memorial Hall on Monday 3rd March 2025.

The Parish Council spent £117.62 from the main account £8.04 from its Reserve account and nothing from the Footpaths account. There were no items of expenditure over £100.

The Parish Council considered one planning application:

24/00246/FULLY SUPPORTED	Construction of new vehicular access	Lydcott Nursery, Black Dog

Again, there was a lot of correspondence to consider, some of the subjects were: The Mid Devon District Council has put out a call to landowners asking them to contact them with any sites that they would be prepared to sell for housing; an Invitation to join the "North Devon Line Rail Promotion Group"; Keep Britain Tidy Campaign confirmed that the Great British Spring Clean would take place between 21 March and 6 April 2025.

It is hoped that the warm weather is around the corner and the pot hole repair material will be warm enough to set in the pot holes – so if any of you have a little time you could spare to assist with repairing potholes please get in touch with either Sarah Gillbard or David Parker.

You may have noticed that a lot of finger posts leading to the village have lost their fingers. Devon County Council will not replace these signs and so if they are to be replaced, the Parish Council will have to pay for them. We have received a quote of £2,595 to replace all the fingers that are missing. Before we make such a large payment which inevitably could add to your precept next year, may we offer an amnesty for anyone that has picked up any of these signs to place it in the "cardboard collecting" shed in the car park of the London Inn and save us having to pay for so many. Landowners please check your hedges in case a sign has been blown over it.

The Parish Council reviewed its assets and their maintenance. Most items appeared in fair order, maintenance was arranged for any items that needed it.

The Parish Council are looking at organising a big Summer event this year and are seeking your ideas – see an article elsewhere in this magazine and let us have your ideas.

Increased Council Tax Bill

All our bills are creeping up and Council Tax increases are also anticipated. There are, however, several options to potentially reduce Council Tax bills.

If you're an adult living alone, your bill can be reduced by 25%. Simply notify the council that you are living alone and the date that became effective. You will be entitled to the discounted rate from that time even if it was some time ago.

Some people are 'disregarded' when calculating Council Tax. This includes under-18s, full-time students, long-term hospital patients, people with severe mental impairments and many more.

Check if you can pay less council tax - Citizens Advice (https://www.citizensadvice.org.uk/housing/council-tax/check-if-you-can-pay-less-council-tax/)

If everyone in a home is disregarded the bill will be reduced by half. If everyone in a home is a student or severely mentally impaired there will be no Council Tax to pay. If you live with an adult who isn't disregarded but who is on a low income or receives certain benefits you might be able to get a 'second adult rebate.' Getting a second adult rebate on your council tax - Citizens Advice (https://www.citizensadvice.org.uk/housing/counciltax/check-if-you-can-get-second-adult-rebate-on-your-council-tax/)

If you or someone you live with is disabled and your home has been adapted, you can ask to be placed down one band. Ask your Council about Council Tax Reduction for people on low incomes. They will ask questions about your income and circumstances; if you are eligible, they will reduce the amount you have to pay. There are also different rules that apply when you've reached State Pension Age. Check your State Pension age - GOV.UK (https://www.gov.uk/state-pension-age)

A 'discretionary reduction' is available whereby your council can reduce or cancel your Council Tax if you can provide evidence that you're suffering severe hardship and can't afford to pay your bill. If you don't get this you can still appeal to a valuation tribunal who, if they agree with you, can order the council to reduce or cancel your bill Applying for Council Tax Reduction - Citizens Advice (https://www.citizensadvice.org.uk/housing/counciltax/applying-for-council-tax-reduction)

The impact of climate change on Africa

Africa is the world's second largest continent extending 8,000 km from north to south. It includes a wide range of climates including the three tropical climates (hot desert, savanna grasslands and tropical rainforest). It is the second most populated continent, with the most youthful population. Education levels are poor with 34% of 15-24 year olds unable to read.

Africa has warmed up by 1 degree Celsius since 1900, but this increase is not uniform across the continent. Kericho, in Kenya for example, has seen maximum temperatures increase by 3.5 degrees since 1985.

Extreme weather events are becoming more common and more intense, with rainy seasons, on which rain-fed agriculture depends, becoming increasingly unreliable. It is this exposure of farming to changes in climate that contribute to the continent's vulnerability. In 2023, 19 countries were listed as experiencing water scarcity. Low agricultural yields for farmers fuel rural-urban and international migration as farmers' incomes fall.

Africa's problems are exacerbated by its debt crisis. By increasing its production of cash crops countries can try and reduce their financial commitments. However, this can result in deforestation which in time leads to more surface run off causing flooding, soil erosion and a lowering of the water table.

As rainfall patterns alter, farmers will make more use of irrigation, lowering water tables until they are beyond the reach of wells and boreholes. Overwatering in hot sunny climates results in mineral-rich water being drawn to the surface. As this water evaporates it leaves behind a hard crust of salt which renders the soil infertile.

Shortages of water will lead to more conflict between countries as they compete for water (river) resources. At a local level, water shortages will force people to rely on poor quality water which will increase the incidence of waterborne diseases such as cholera. These diseases will put pressure on the countries' healthcare systems, diverting governmental and aid monies.

As humidity, and where rainfall increases, the spread of disease will also occur, it is anticipated that the area affected by malaria will double in size putting 7.2 million people at risk.

Africa is one of the most biodiverse places on Earth, it contains 20% of all known plant, mammal and bird species, and 17% of all amphibians and reptiles. Fragile habitats will not survive climate change with 20-50% of species facing extinction.

Low lying African countries are particularly susceptible to coastal erosion and flooding. 20 million people in Nigeria live in the coastal zone, while 90% of Gambian households are said to be at risk. Rising sea levels increase the rate of coastal erosion as well as flooding coastal areas. Salty sea water will percolate into rock, making groundwater supplies salty and unfit for human consumption and agricultural use.

Africa has 18.3% of the World's population, but only contributed 3.9% of the World's carbon dioxide emissions in 2021. By way of comparison the UK has 0.86% of the World's population and emits 5% of World carbon dioxide emissions.

Morchard's Weather

So, we have just had a fortnight without rain and the rain we had today - the 12th March - was not worth mentioning. This is not overly unusual as February can often be dry - in 2023, only 6mm rain fell in the whole month. Unusually, I've been watering the garden, but then we have had frosts as well. The first week of March we had frost most mornings, but really nice sunny days as a high pressure system held over the UK



On the third of March I registered a low of minus 2C and then on the 9th March a high of almost 17C.

In March, we also reach the spring equinox, when hours of day and night are equal - a moment of temporary balance. In some way it marks the transition between the long winter months and the forthcoming warmer days of spring and summer.

The morning of Friday, 14th March, early risers were treated with views of a lunar eclipse around 6am low on the horizon, when the moon became a deep blood red as it moved into the Earth's shadow.

The daffodils along the road verges are telling us though that Spring is almost here. Buds are budding, songbirds are singing and hares are haring around - if you are lucky enough to see one.





The benefits of Gardening and Nature on Our Health and Wellbeing

"Illnesses do not come upon us out of the blue. They are developed from small daily sins against Nature. When enough sins have accumulated, illnesses will suddenly appear."

— Hippocrates

Human beings are part of nature and are healthier when they have a connection to it. Whether that be by working all day with wildlife animals or plants; spending weekends in our garden; going for long walks in the woods or playing with the family on the beach; being in the natural world (as opposed to manmade environments), surrounded by it and engaging with it, stopping and focussing, does us good. Even reading about it and immersing our imagination in it has some benefits. If you can't get out into it for whatever reason (and even if you can) then books about it can bring it all in to you, from rainbows of flowers to rugged coastlines, way up to 8,000 feet above the earth, riding with sleeping birds, down to all kinds of subterranean hidden spaces.


Most people who have learnt about gardening over the last six plus decades will have come across Dr Hessayon's ... Expert series of books - some of the most accessible guides ever written on just about every area of gardening. It is fortunate he covered so many areas before we lost him, aged 96, this January. One of the reasons gardening is so beneficial is that it is a pursuit which encourages us to stop rushing and multi-tasking and give our focussed attention to something natural, to other living beings very different from us, outside ourselves, enabling us to connect with them and do so in an increasingly informed way.

Other books can supplement this (or even replace it for those of us who are limited in our access to it) and cover other areas of the natural world, aspects we aren't trying to manage, just observe. A beautiful illustrated gift of an historic wildflower guide can bring moments of complete engagement, filling the technical specification of the plant with new depth and joy by examining the wonderfully hand coloured illustrations in detail.



With a more practical modern, but still beautiful, approach William Keble Martin, the famous author and illustrator of the 1965 book *Concise British Flora in Colour*, is still the the go-to guide for getting to know and identifying our native wildflowers. It was written just up the road in Great Torrington when he was 88. Of even more local interest, he also authored *Flora of Devon* (1939).

Digging deeper, Robert Macfarlane's *Underland* (2019), explores sea caves and geology bringing them to awe-inspiring life, whilst soaring high, *Crow Country* by Mark Cocker (2008), is set in Norfolk, though anyone in Morchard would be likely to recognise the crows and rooks which lead the book's flight to and from the different roosts.



More recently Helen Macdonald has secured her reputation as a great nature writer with *H* is for Hawk (2015) and Vesper Flights (2021), the title of which is taken from the amazing sleeping habits of swifts. The collection of essays reflects not just on swifts but on many different areas of the natural world and our relationship with it, transporting the reader in its lyrical flow and fierce clarity of understanding.

Returning to earth and closer to home again, David Kennard's 2004 book, *A Shepherds Watch*, takes us into another, even more interwoven, interaction with the natural world, as he draws the reader into a year in the life of a North Devon sheep farmer.

Whichever it is that calls to you, and whether it's an audio book or print, books can fill you with nature and the natural world always should be a part of us, as we are of it. How can we be whole without it?


