Morchard's Weather

The wettest day was 17th April, when 29 mm (1.1 inches) fell. The heaviest downpour was on 9th September, when it rained at a rate of 108 mm (4 and a quarter inches) per hour - just for a short period thank goodness. Wettest month so far was January, but that was before the latest storm Claudia. So far, we have had about 600 mm (23 inches) of rain, compared to over 1000 mm (40 inches) last year. It has certainly been a dry year. Warmest day was 10th July at 30.4 C (86.7F).

It's difficult to say whether this is an ongoing trend or not, but it does appear that this type of weather is occurring more often at these latitudes. As write this, Monmouth is almost completely flooded and the River Ouse in York is at breaking point. The line between Barnstaple and Exeter - the closest one to us - was also closed due to localised flooding. We have a way to go though to catch up with the wettest places. Top of the list is Columbia with 3,200mm (126 inches) per year!

Snow wardens

One of the best things about village life here in Morchard Bishop is the way local people get on with the jobs that need doing. For example, we have a potholing team and a snow warden team.

winter. This entails spreading a little salt onto the footpaths in your area when icy conditions are expected. The salt is provided by the council and the parish council distributes the sacks all around the village. We just need a little help to spread it. 



CALLING ALL GARDENERS



Sustainable Morchard are asking all gardeners to start saving seeds from their flowers, vegetables and herbs, not only for your own use next year but also for Morchard Bishop annual seed share to be held on the 7th of March 2026 in the village hall, make a date in your diary and come along to pick up some free seeds. The Saturday morning café will be open as usual. This event is free but we ask for a donation to cover our cost and to go towards future events.

What is a seed share and why are we doing it?

A seed share works by people bringing seeds they have saved or have left over, and taking away other peoples' seeds to use. If you don't have any seeds, please come along anyway and take some seeds, grow the plants and perhaps save seeds for next year. We have information about how to save seeds. Pick up a leaflet from the stall, or go to: http://www.realseeds.co.ul/seedsavinginfo.html - they have lots of advice.

Good reasons for saving seeds include:

Helps protect biodiversity and keeps the diversity of locally adapted varieties going. Maintains and develops growing skills.

Gets around the National List, which makes it illegal to sell varieties not on the list. This is why we do not charge for the seeds, voluntary donations are only to cover our expenses and go towards future events.

Seed shares keep seed production local and help resist the privatisation of plant genetic material.

Seed shares introduce you to other local gardeners and help to develop a sense of community.

Saving seeds can also save you money! ☺





Folk Tales Corner

Many Happy Returns

My sympathies to those of you born on 25th December. It must be difficult having your special, once a year day, a day that is just for you, be totally eclipsed by the celebrations for someone else's birthday. And you can't even moan about it because he's a bloomin' demi-god. I offer you this small level of comfort, or at least schadenfreude: Jesus had to put up with the same problem when he was a kid.





Because the 25th of December has moved a couple of times with respect to the actual solar year it is not quite the day it once was. It used to be more firmly attached to the winter solstice and was the day of the new born sun after the night of deepest darkness. Thus it has been a popular day for deities and demi-deities to breathe their first breath in their prophesied mortal incarnation for at least three millennia.

The Ancient Egyptian gods Osiris, and his son, Horus were both born on a day that can be translated as the 25th Dec. Due to the conflict between Set and Osiris, Isis gave birth to Horus while hiding in exile but he still went on to become the solar deity, which is not bad going since Ra was already doing that job.

The Greeks celebrated the births of both Dionysus, god of wine and parties, and Hercules, son of Zeus and all-round heroic strong man, on the 25th December. The birth of Dionysus was a decidedly odd affair since his mother, Semele, was burned to death while pregnant as a result of some typical machinations by Hera, and Zeus sewed the miraculously unharmed foetus in to his thigh, from which Dionysus burst when he was sufficiently grown. Hercules, in contrast to his half brother's premature exposure and paternal incubation, was born a week late as Hera sent her daughter, Eileithyia, goddess of child birth, to sit with her legs crossed outside the room where Hercules' mother, Alcmene, was in labour in order to kill Hercules in the womb. Realising what the problem was, two friends of Alcmene, called Galanthis and Historis, tricked Eileithyia by suddenly crying out in joy and announcing the birth, which rather surprised the goddess who then stood up and ran in to the room to see what had happened, thus uncrossing her legs and allowing the infant Herc to be pushed out. Phew!

Hurricanes, Typhoons and Cyclones

As I write this the Foreign Office is advising against all travel to the Philippines as it prepares for the arrival of Super Typhoon Fung-Wong.

Typhoons, cyclones and hurricanes are the same thing - they're all tropical storms. Their geographical location determines which name is to be applied.

Tropical storms only occur in certain locations, as only certain parts of the globe meet the requisite conditions for such storms to occur. The key factor in hurricane development are ocean temperatures in excess of 26 degrees Celsius. These warm seas provide the energy to heat the overlying air which expands, and becomes less dense; as it is heated it starts to rise, creating low pressure. Strong winds high in the atmosphere (10-12 km altitude) help draw this rising air even higher.

Hurricanes often start as a cluster of low pressure thunderstorms. Providing there is low wind shear i.e. similar wind speeds at different heights, these clusters may converge to form deeper, faster rising air.

The final factor is the Coriolis force. The Earth's rotation impacts on liquids and gasses moving across the Earth's surface. It is the Coriolis force that makes water spiral down a plug hole. The Coriolis force is strongest at the Poles and non-existent at the Equator. Air is sucked into the centre of the low pressure system in an anti-clockwise direction (clockwise in the Southern Hemisphere). The Coriolis force is too weak between 0 and 5 degrees of latitude for hurricanes to form. Beyond 30 degrees the seas are too cool for hurricanes to form. So hurricanes are found in two distinct belts between 5 and 30 degrees north and south of the Equator.

As the air rises in the centre of the hurricane two things happen: air from surrounding areas of high pressure is sucked into the storm to cause winds (the deeper the depression the stronger the wind); and as the air cools on rising, the water vapour condenses to form clouds and rain, as well as releasing more heat during the process of condensation which further fuels the rising air mass.

Typhoon Hung-Wong recorded sustained wind speeds of 115 mph, and gusts of 140 mph. These wind speeds uproot trees and telegraph poles, rip off roofs from homes and buildings, severely damage the country's infrastructure, and destroy crops. Heavy rainfall causes flooding, disrupting communications and industrial output as well as forcing people to temporarily abandon their homes. The heavy rainfall can help induce landslides and mudflows as rock and soil become lubricated and weaken the stability of steeper slopes. The strong winds contribute to the creation of storm surges.



A storm surge occurs when a number of factors work to the same end result - high seas and large waves. Air pressure in hurricane can be as low as 950 mb. Low pressure results in a raised sea level, 10mm for every 1 mb drop in pressure. Sea levels may rise by half a metre due to low pressure. This together with a spring high tide (spring high tides are the highest tides, neap tides being the lowest) and strong on-shore winds, waves several metres high can cause significant flooding.

Given the role of warm seas in hurricane formation it is predicted that the number of severe hurricanes will increase with climate change. Meteorologists and other climate scientists do not have sufficient evidence to declare that the number of hurricanes will increase. However, this would seem a likely result of warming seas as the critical temperature will be met over a wider area than now.

News from your Parish Council

The Parish Council met in the Memorial Hall on Monday 3rd November 2025.

The Parish Council spent £1,305.18 from the main account, £385 from its Reserve account and nothing from the Footpaths account. The items of expenditure over £100 were £1,050.80 for the Clerk's salary for July to September, £166.06 for the winter planting of the village floral displays and £385 for a new tree on the Green to replace the cherry tree that had to be taken down. Again there were no planning applications for the Parish Council to consider – perhaps a sign of the lack of economic optimism.

Reports from our County and District Councillors included:

Pots and Pans Collections Have Started! The permanent collection of unusable metal pots and pans is now in operation. If residents want more recycling containers, please contact Mid Devon District Council (MDDC) and they will deliver them. Also, and if residents want to know how they can recycle more as a household, please contact MDDC's team of advisers who will offer in-person, telephone and online advice. Please email MDDC at bin-it123@middevon.gov.uk or call 01884 255255.

(ii) Awaab's Law was officially introduced on 27 October and brings in new legal duties for social housing providers to investigate and act upon hazards in tenants' homes. Social landlords must address all emergency hazards and all damp and mould hazards that present significant risk of harm to tenants to fixed timeframes.

(iii) MDDC Residents' Survey 2025 is open. The more people that take part in this survey, the better the Council can respond to your needs! Please find details of the 2025 Residents' Survey at this address: https://letstalk.middevon.gov.uk/resident-survey-2025 and do please take part: this is used to assist the Council in deciding how much to precept and how best to spend your money.

Conversations continued about how to get Devon Highways to respond to the Parish Council's concerns about drains, flooding and signposting. A meeting had been diarised with the local Highways Officer. The Parish Council agreed to purchase a Vehicle Activated Speed Sign to encourage drivers to stay within the speed limit as a minimum.

A Crab Apple Tree has now been planted on the Green by the Bus Shelter.

The lighting of the Bus Shelter and the Village Nativity would take place on Sunday 14 December at 5.45pm at the Bus Shelter.

Devon Countryside Access Forum – call for Members. The Devon Countryside Access Forum (DCAF) is a statutory local access forum under the Countryside and Rights of Way Act 2000, with a remit to give independent advice on improving public access to land and the enjoyment thereof. It has eighteen members appointed by Devon County Council who represent the interests of access users, for example walkers, cyclists, horse-riders and trail riders; landowners or managers, and people with other relevant expertise such as conservation, tourism, planning and health.

ARE YOU AN UNPAID CARER FOR A MEMBER OF YOUR FAMILY?

As a Parish Council, we are becoming increasingly aware that a significant number of people living in Morchard Bishop are caring full-time for a parent or partner.

We are planning to put in place a support system which will offer practical assistance to the carer so that they can have a quality of life too.

We have spoken to several unpaid carers already and they would welcome this help, but we would like to speak to as many carers as possible to guide us as to what help is needed and how we might best organise it.



Conifers, especially firs

(based on 16th century Silesian folk song credited to Melchior Franck)

What is a conifer? It is a gymnosperm (as opposed to angiosperm which is the flowering plant) meaning naked seed. The other gymnosperms are gingkos, cycads and geophytes, but conifers are the most familiar of the woody, cone bearing families of the naked-seed plants.

In pre-historic times they were the dominant plant form, now they are in many cases more significant in specific strongholds. In large part these are more extreme climates, colder, higher altitude spaces they are better adapted to survive. Many groups of conifers have developed characteristics which allow them to bear snow safely, and shrug it off more easily with a conical overall shape. Their internal vessels are strong and can withstand impressive levels of ice. Through these and other adaptations, such as resinous sap, they have survived extinctions brought on by environmental challenges, losing ground only where the conditions are easy for the flowering deciduous trees to push in.

In winter time conifers come to our attention more as a lot of the group are also mostly evergreen; there are a few deciduous conifers (Larch, Dawn Redwoods, swamp Cypress) but the vast majority do not have a winter bald season and so have for a long time been popular for winter decorations.

Abies, the genus of fir, was likely to have been the tree first used for Xmas trees in 16th century Germany, as reflected in the Tanne (fir) baum (tree) song.

Now most common fir species is *Abies normanniana*, the Caucasian, or Normand fir, as it has low needle drop. Many of us will have grown up with Norway or European Spruce, *Picea abies* as our Xmas tree. Its name means that, although it's a spruce (*Picea*), it appears like a fir (*Abies*).

If you happen to be sat around one this Xmas you might remember that *Picea abies* was the first of the gymnosperm (naked seed, non-flowering plants) to have its genome sequenced – it is quite large compared to other plants. When compared to other conifers it turns out they have in large part retained their DNA variations over the years, rather than eliminating bits, and keeping DNA variety for a rainy day seems to be paying off for them. So as you sit around your newly transplanted indoor conifer, in the naked seed family, replete with mince pies and other seasonal feasting, you can wonder at quite how long these trees have been hoarding their genetic variations.
